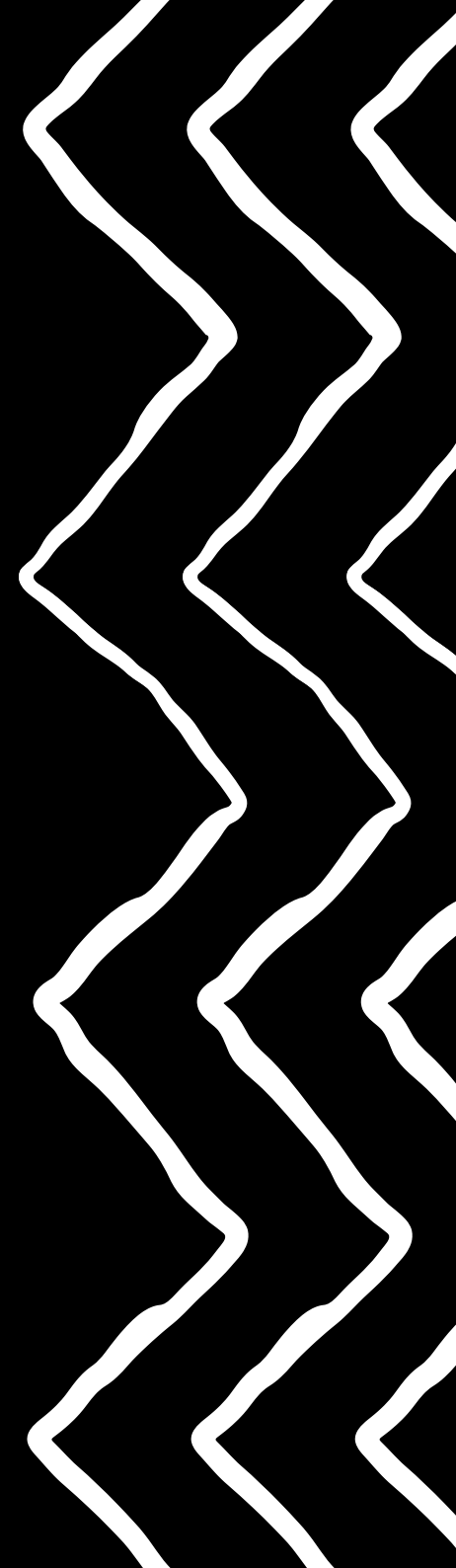

Midn Marr has been performing and teaching culture for the last six years across WA schools, universities and businesses.

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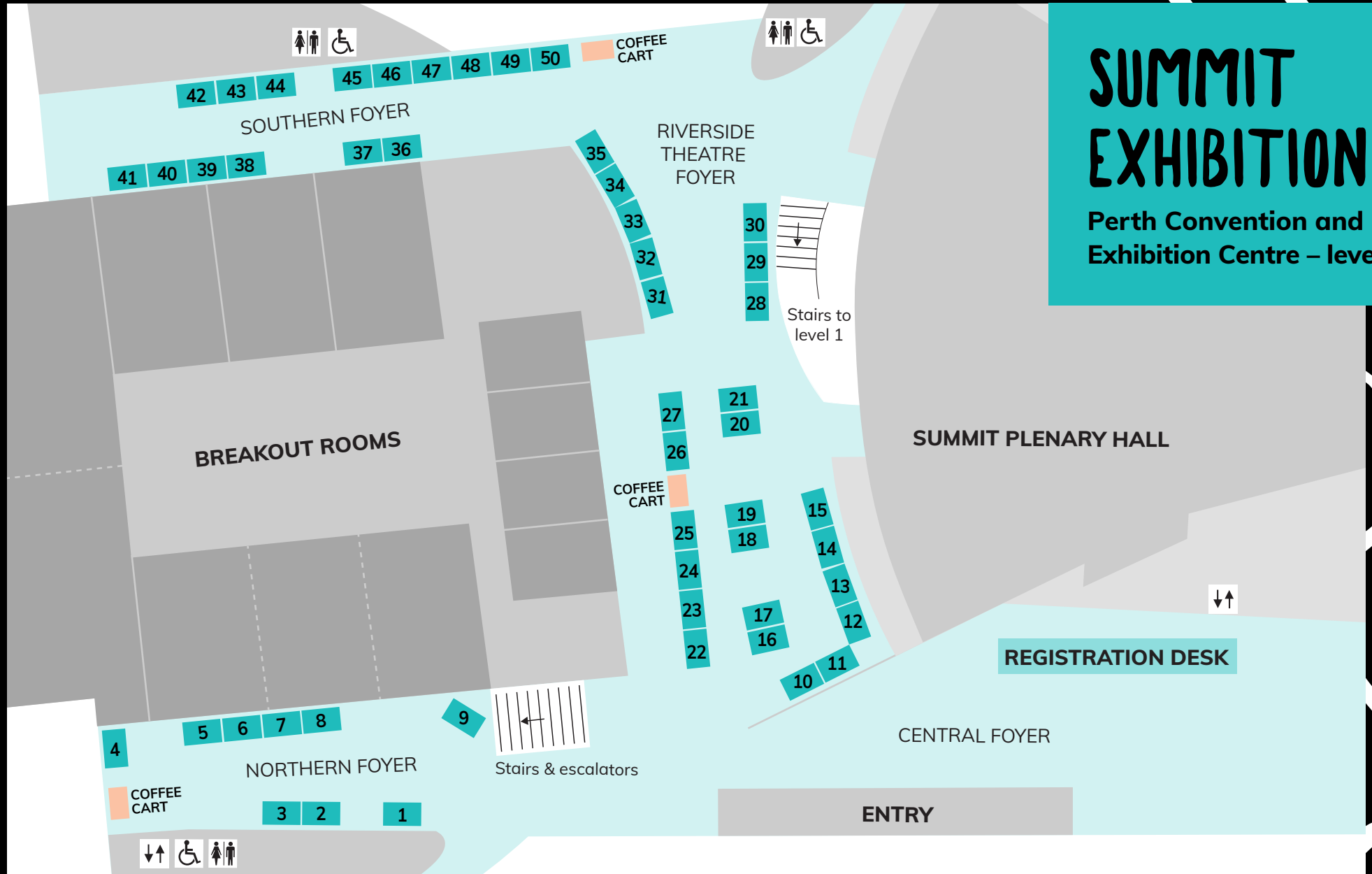
