INTRODUCTION

- 1. As part of the Inquiry process, the Commission asked the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) to analyse data from the 1999 Community Housing and Infrastructure Needs Survey (CHINS) and produce a series of maps from this analysis. The following maps are the result of that work.




Figure 1 DISTRIBUTION OF INDIGENOUS POPULATION — AUSTRALIA

 - (i) Figure 1 geographic distribution of the Indigenous population within Australia and some States (New South Wales, Queensland, Western Australia, South Australia and Northern Territory).




Figure 2 DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — AUSTRALIA

 - (ii) Figures 2 to 14 the location and size of discrete Indigenous communities within Australia, some States (New South Wales, Queensland, Western Australia, South Australia and Northern Territory), and some ATSIC regions. In some figures, communities have been identified using reference numbers. Tables that identify the names of those communities are attached to the figures.
 - (iii) Figures 15 to 20 the geographic distribution of the Indigenous population and discrete Indigenous communities within Australia and some States (New South Wales, Queensland, Western Australia, South Australia and Northern Territory).
 - (iv) Figures 21 to 23 distance to the nearest health facility (hospital, community health centre and chemist) for discrete Indigenous communities within Australia.
 - (v) Figure 24 access to medical air service for discrete Indigenous communities within Australia.
 - (vi) Figures 25 to 31 frequency of access to health professionals (doctor, registered nurse, dentist, male Indigenous health worker, female Indigenous health worker, drug and alcohol worker and mental health worker) for discrete Indigenous communities within Australia.
 - (vii) Figure 32 availability of environmental health worker in discrete Indigenous communities within Australia.
 - (viii) Figures 33 to 35 distance to nearest school (primary, secondary to year 10 and secondary to year 12) for discrete Indigenous communities within Australia.

- (ix) Figure 36 type of housing organisation and number of permanent dwellings for discrete community organisations and urban housing organisations within Australia.
- (x) Figure 37 and 38 number and percentage of dwellings needing major repairs or replacement within Australia.
- (xi) Figure 39 type of housing organisation and percentage of dwellings needing major repairs or replacement within Australia.
- (xii) Figures 40 to 45 main source of drinking water in discrete Indigenous communities within Australia and some States (New South Wales, Queensland, Western Australia, South Australia and Northern Territory).
- (xiii) Figures 46 to 50 main source of electricity for discrete Indigenous communities within Australia and some States (Queensland, Western Australia, South Australia and Northern Territory).





Figure 3 DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — NEW SOUTH WALES




Figure 5 DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES (LESS THAN 20 PEOPLE)




Figure 6 DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — WESTERN AUSTRALIA^(a)




Figure 7 DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — DERBY AND KUNUNURRA ATSIC REGIONS^(a)




Figure 8 DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — SOUTH AUSTRALIA





Figure 9 DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — NORTHERN TERRITORY




Figure 11 DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — APATULA ATSIC REGION^(a)


Figure 13 DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — KATHERINE AND TENNANT CREEK ATSIC REGIONS^(a)

Figure 14 DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — NHULUNBUY ATSIC REGION^(a)






Figure 17 INDIGENOUS POPULATION DISTRIBUTION AND DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — QUEENSLAND




Figure 18 INDIGENOUS POPULATION DISTRIBUTION AND DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — WESTERN AUSTRALIA




Figure 19 INDIGENOUS POPULATION DISTRIBUTION AND DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — SOUTH AUSTRALIA





Figure 20 INDIGENOUS POPULATION DISTRIBUTION AND DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — NORTHERN TERRITORY






Figure 22 DISTANCE TO NEAREST COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTRE FOR DISCRETE INDIGNEOUS COMMUNITIES



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
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Figure 23 DISTANCE TO NEAREST CHEMIST FOR DISCRETE INDIGENOUS **COMMUNITIES**

Figure 24 ACCESS TO MEDICAL AIR SERVICE FOR DISCRETE INDIGNEOUS COMMUNITIES







Figure 25 FREQUENCY OF ACCESS TO A DOCTOR FOR DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES

Figure 26 FREQUENCY OF ACCESS TO A REGISTERED NURSE FOR DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES







Figure 27 FREQUENCY OF ACCESS TO A DENTIST FOR DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES





Figure 29 FREQUENCY OF ACCESS TO A FEMALE INDIGENOUS HEALTH WORKER FOR DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES





Figure 31 FREQUENCY OF ACCESS TO A MENTAL HEALTH WORKER FOR DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES

Figure 32 LENGTH OF TIME ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH WORKER IN COMMUNITY








Figure 33 DISTANCE TO NEAREST PRIMARY SCHOOL FOR DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES




Figure 36 TYPE OF HOUSING ORGANISATION BY NUMBER OF PERMANENT DWELLINGS — DISCRETE/URBAN




Figure 37 NUMBER OF DWELLINGS NEEDING MAJOR REPAIRS OR REPLACEMENT






Figure 38 PERCENTAGE OF DWELLINGS NEEDING MAJOR REPAIRS OR REPLACEMENT








Figure 40 MAIN SOURCE OF DRINKING WATER IN DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — AUSTRALIA




Figure 41 MAIN SOURCE OF DRINKING WATER IN DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — NEW SOUTH WALES





Figure 42 MAIN SOURCE OF WATER IN DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — QUEENSLAND






Figure 43 MAIN SOURCE OF DRINKING WATER IN DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — WESTERN AUSTRALIA




Figure 45 MAIN SOURCE OF DRINKING WATER IN DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — NORTHERN TERRITORY




Figure 46 MAIN SOURCE OF ELECTRICITY IN DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — AUSTRALIA




Figure 47 MAIN SOURCE OF ELECTRICITY IN DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — QUEENSLAND






Figure 48 MAIN SOURCE OF ELECTRICITY IN DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — WESTERN AUSTRALIA










Figure 50 MAIN SOURCE OF ELECTRICITY IN DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — NORTHERN TERRITORY









Figure 52 TYPE OF SEWERAGE SYSTEM FOR DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — QUEENSLAND







Figure 53 TYPE OF SEWERAGE SYSTEM FOR DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — WESTERN AUSTRALIA




Figure 55 TYPE OF SEWERAGE SYSTEM FOR DISCRETE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES — NORTHERN TERRITORY
