Leonard Hill, AIATSIS Interim CEO

Leonard is the Interim Chief Executive Officer of the Australian Institute of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies (AIATSIS) and an Indigenous man from the Ngemba nation from North-west New South Wales.

Leonard has held a number of Senior Executive Service (SES) Officer roles in a long public service career including Deputy CEO and Chief Operating Officer at AIATSIS; Executive Director, Collections Services Group at AIATSIS, and Assistant Secretary Culture Branch with the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet.



Jodie Sizer, AIATSIS Chairperson

Jodie Sizer is a Djap Wurrung/Gunditjmara woman and one of Australia's foremost Indigenous leaders. In July 2021, Jodie was appointed the inaugural CEO of the Great Ocean Road Coast and Parks Authority to deliver better protection and management of the iconic coast and parks of Victoria's Great Ocean

Road. She is the Co-founder and former Co-CEO of Australia's leading Indigenous consulting firm, PwC Indigenous Consulting.

Jodie is qualified as a Certified Practising Accountant; Chair of the Australian Institute of Aboriginal Torres Strait Islander Studies; a Director of the Ebony Institute; and Vice-President of prominent Australian sporting organisation the Collingwood Football Club, leading the transformational change process to address systemic racism, commissioning the Do Better report and its implementation.



Rueben Berg, Co-Chair, First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria

Rueben Berg is a proud Gunditjmara man, and a Co-Chair of the First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria (the Assembly).

As an elected Co-Chair of the Assembly, Rueben plays a pivotal role in representing the diverse voices and aspirations of First Nations communities in Victoria. With a deep commitment to advancing the rights and interests of First Nations people, Rueben is passionate about ensuring Treaty delivers Aboriginal communities the power and tools to develop and deliver practical solutions at a local level.



Ngarra Murray, Co-Chair, First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria

Ngarra Murray is a proud Wamba Wamba, Yorta Yorta, Dhudhuroa and Dja Dja Wurrung woman who grew up in Shepparton, and is Co-Chair of the First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria (the Assembly).

As the elected Co-Chair, Ngarra is a spokesperson for the Assembly. Her role is to elevate the voices and priorities of Community members on the journey to Treaties in Victoria. She is committed to meeting with all Traditional Owner groups and spending time 'talking Treaty' with communities to foster nation-building and consensus-building throughout her term.
