Brief abstract: Interviews with Kalkadoon Tribal Elders and concerned people recorded among the rock art on a picnic day for the Elders ‘on country’ at Painted Rocks and Sun Rock; significant sites in Kalkadoon country near Mount Isa, on Thursday 18th October 1984. The Elder’s picnic day is part of Kalkadoon Tribal Council’s week long Cultural Revival Festival, to mark the Centenary of Battle Mountain Massacre. Interviewees are: brothers William Malcolm and George Thorpe, and Morris Carlton. Arthur Peterson recites some local tunes on his didjeridu.

00:00	Kalkadoon Elder William Malcolm (“Old Willie” or “Bing”) interviews to camera. He speaks of his own birth on Westbank Station near Cloncurry in 1910, and of growing up in the region, from Cloncurry to Riversleigh to Kajabbi. He speaks of the early years of mining in the region, and camel trains and drays transporting the ore.
03:35	Indigenous Elder and dancer William Foster born at Borroloola N.T. speaks about

	dancing and culture. He believes the parents are still passing the culture on to their children.
05:07	Shot of James Taylor hosting and cooking on an open camp fire.
05:13	Waanyi Elder and Jungiman for the region Arthur Peterson wetting and washing his didjeridu, in preparation to play.
08:07	Arthur Peterson plays didjeridu.
12:20	Kalkadoon Elder George Thorpe interviews to camera, accompanied by May Taylor. He speaks of his early life in Mount Isa. His father died in Urandangi. His mother remarried Dick Hayden, then manager of Chatsworth Station. His eldest brother Billy died in Mount Isa some 22 years ago. His sister went to the Kennedys' Devoncourt Station. He talks about how Dick Hayden died when he was still just a boy: "shot himself with the bloody horrors" on his way from Boulia Races to a new appointment at Canobie Station.
16:16	Kalkadoon Elder George Thorpe speaks of Kalkadoon history; of a waterhole on Calton Hills Station where the rocks are pitted with gunfire, where a wounded Kalkadoon almost drowned Old Man Kennedy. He says that his mother never spoke about Battle Mountain. He starts to recall a story told to him long after she died, of a man named Prosser, and a place down along the Leichhardt below Glenroy...
