00:00	Recording starts with vision of unidentified Indigenous young people at Poppas Snack Wagon in Mount Isa, and audio of the unidentified interviewer and subject; Kalkadoon and Waanyi Elder, Song Man (Jungiman) for the region, Arthur Peterson, talking off camera.
01:10	The camera shifts to Arthur Peterson; he is asked how boomerangs and didjeridus are made.
01:40	Arthur Peterson responds, describing boomerang and didgeridoo production. He speaks about what his grandfather taught him.

04:45	Interviewer asks if he thinks that the young European children are interested in Aboriginal culture.
06:30	Arthur Peterson talks about how to play the didjeridu.
09:10	No audio – drops out for 20 sec.
09:30	Audio returns. Interview continues. Interviewer asks Peterson if he thinks about Aboriginal peoples' survival into the future. Peterson talks about loss of culture, and about the imperative to 'stick up with their culture, and push on with their law'.
13:45	End.
