




Research Strategies for Large Claims: A NSW Perspective


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- 23 registered claims since 1996 still awaiting determination
- Totaling 367,449 square kilometers
- Covering 46% of NSW

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92% of NSW under claim is covered by only **3 separate claims**.

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Q: Why do 87% of registered claims account for only 8% of the total area under claim?

A: Since the mid 1990s NSW claims have tended to follow a pattern:

- a) Assistance requests tend to be submitted by individuals, single families or small alliances of 2-3 families.
- a) Claims filed in response to s29 notices cover only isolated geographic sites.
- b) Expert advice tends to be biased in favour of existing conditions, and shuns new data that expands upon those conditions.





Q: Why do **only 3** claims account for only 92% of the total area under claim?

A: Since the mid 2006 NTSCORP has implemented a strategy the involves:


- a) Encouraging the withdrawal of exclusive and vexatious claims.
- a) Focusing support on claims in which claimants are unified.
- b) Removing artificial administrative barriers between research staff working on different claims, integrating all research into a coherent state-wide strategy.






Since 2006, as part of a strategic overhaul, the NTSCORP Research Unit has developed:


- A data management system that hosts searchable digital copies of all anthropological, linguistic, and historical records discovered, including consultations, academic texts, government documents, archival material, and photographs.
- A single, integrated genealogical model for the Indigenous population of South East Australia, documenting over 70,000 individuals, currently growing at a rate of >7500 individuals per year.
- A single, integrated geospatial model of all data that allows us to map the movements of any person, group of people, or cultural attributes (languages, totemic groups, etc) in space and time.






























Concluding Notes:

- NTSCORP uses research as a primary tool in developing assistance strategies for for new claims.
- Research is **not treated as a rubber stamp** for existing claim group descriptions or claim area boundaries.
- Comprehensive consultations, genealogical and GIS modelling, and archival surveys, are conducted **before** education workshops or authorisation meetings are convened.
- Theoretical anthropological models of society are jettisoned in favour of real data.





To make large claims viable, Rep Body Research Units must have:

- **Independence** to conduct research freely, without administrative restrictions.
- Capacity to communicate and share data with other Researchers in the organisation, without barriers imposed by poor technology.
- No theoretical preconceptions about the populations they are modelling.
- Total respect for ALL clients, not just those with whom they work.
