

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

Can Indigenous Australians lead the Northern Development Agenda?

Some Far Northern Queensland Observations and Opportunities

Allan Dale – Chair RDA FNQ&TS and Professor of Tropical Regional Development

Allan's focus is on supporting tropical nations, regions, communities and institutions to build healthier governance systems. His focus is in northern Australia, the Great Barrier Reef, climate adaptation and tropical regional development.

The Northern Whitepaper and TOs

Traditional Owners in northern Australia have seen past attempts at northern development that:

- Are about facilitating investment from outside players into northern Australia
- See Indigenous land and water tenures, rights and interests as barriers to development
- Seek to import cheap outside labour......

This despite Traditional Owners having rights/interests across at least 94% of the north.

What will make a new agenda different?



Eventual Considerations In Northern White Paper

- Supporting the native title system (\$110 million pa) to finalise in a decade
- \$20.4 m to support native title owners to engage potential investors
- \$10.6 m to support TOs to pilot reforms to broaden economic activity
- COAG Indigenous land review to explore use options for exclusive native title
- \$17 m to support freeholding/leaseholding in townships
- Limited focus on Indigenous water rights.



A Bold Prediction

With the right supports and governance systems, **Traditional Owner institutions** will likely be the primary economic units across much of the northern Australian landscape by 2050.



Progressively resolving ongoing native title/ALRA claim issues and further exploring new resource use rights

- Need for continuous improvement in the claims process
- Greater internal/ external reconciliation in claims
- Actively managing tenure information and building understanding of all communal tenure holders.

Supporting and resourcing the capacity of Traditional Owners to develop effective country-based /spatial land use planning

- Thinking of the estate in tenure blind terms
- What's the cultural foundations for protection and opportunities for economic development and wealth generation
- What's the interface with township-based planning.

Exploring further tenure and financial mechanisms for facilitating investment leverage (within the ALRA, trust and Indigenous leasehold/freehold estates)


- Being clear about where development will occur and governance arrangements around those developments.
- Deciding the distinction between owners and managers.
- Trialing new legal approaches to raise finance or subleases.
- Communal tenure is not a barrier to sensitive development.

Supporting Traditional Owners to explore new and innovative governance models for driving planning, development and managing emerging "wealth funds"

- Seeing the entire tribal/clan population as an asset in both leadership, management and cultural strengthening /renewal
- New governance approaches that more successfully separate ownership from management
- Sorting the difference between wealth distribution and investing back in the governance and the strengths of group individual
- Innovative financial management mechanisms to grow wealth both within and beyond tribal/ clan boundaries
- Supporting Traditional Owners to explore innovative governance models for managing planning and emerging "wealth funds".

National mechanisms to grow financial guarantees

- Exploring some form of northern Australian "guarantee or trust fund" to support Traditional Owners with sound business investment projects to secure commercial finance.
- Funded either from amendment to existing or new government funds, private sector investment or innovative investment of local Traditional Owner-based sovereign wealth funds at local scale.
- Partnering, at the northern Australian level with international and national lending institutions to build investment confidence.
