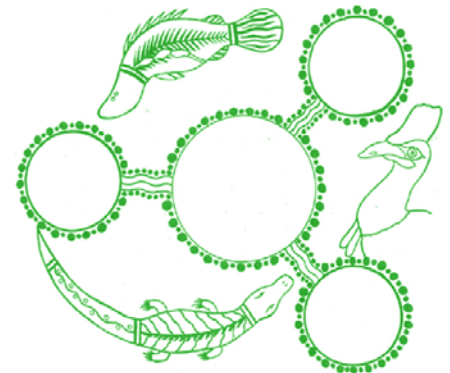

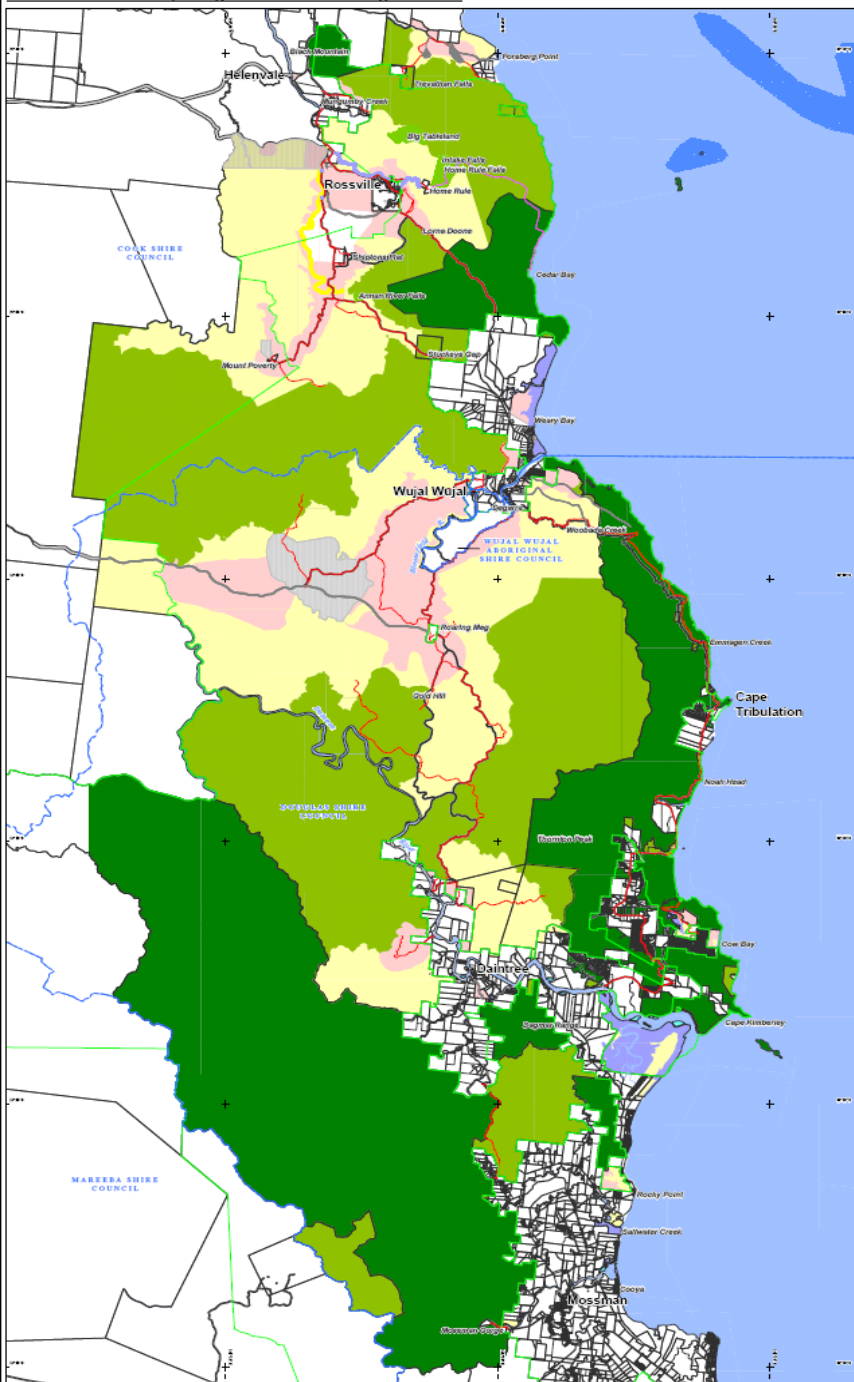
Jabalbina's Vision

As Trustees of Eastern Kuku Yalanji Peoples' traditional estate our vision is to be caring custodians of bubu (land) so Bama benefit culturally, economically, academically and socially, while enhancing Eastern Kuku Yalanji tribal lore and cultural values.

We aspire to be self-funded by exploring and developing available opportunities.



Jabalbina Tenures



Pink (Aboriginal Freehold)

Yalanji undertake community development planning to move back onto bub (land) and develop livelihoods.

Yellow (Aboriginal Freehold - but management is for conservation)

Yalanji complete Indigenous protected area plans and manage land for environmental and cultural values

Green (National Parks)

Yalanji work with QPWS to do:

- Activity guidelines
- Local Area Plans
- Park Management Plans

Grey/Blue (Reserves) eg Cow Bay, Weary Bay

- Yalanji work with Cook Shire Council or Douglas Shire Council to make plans to manage Reserves together

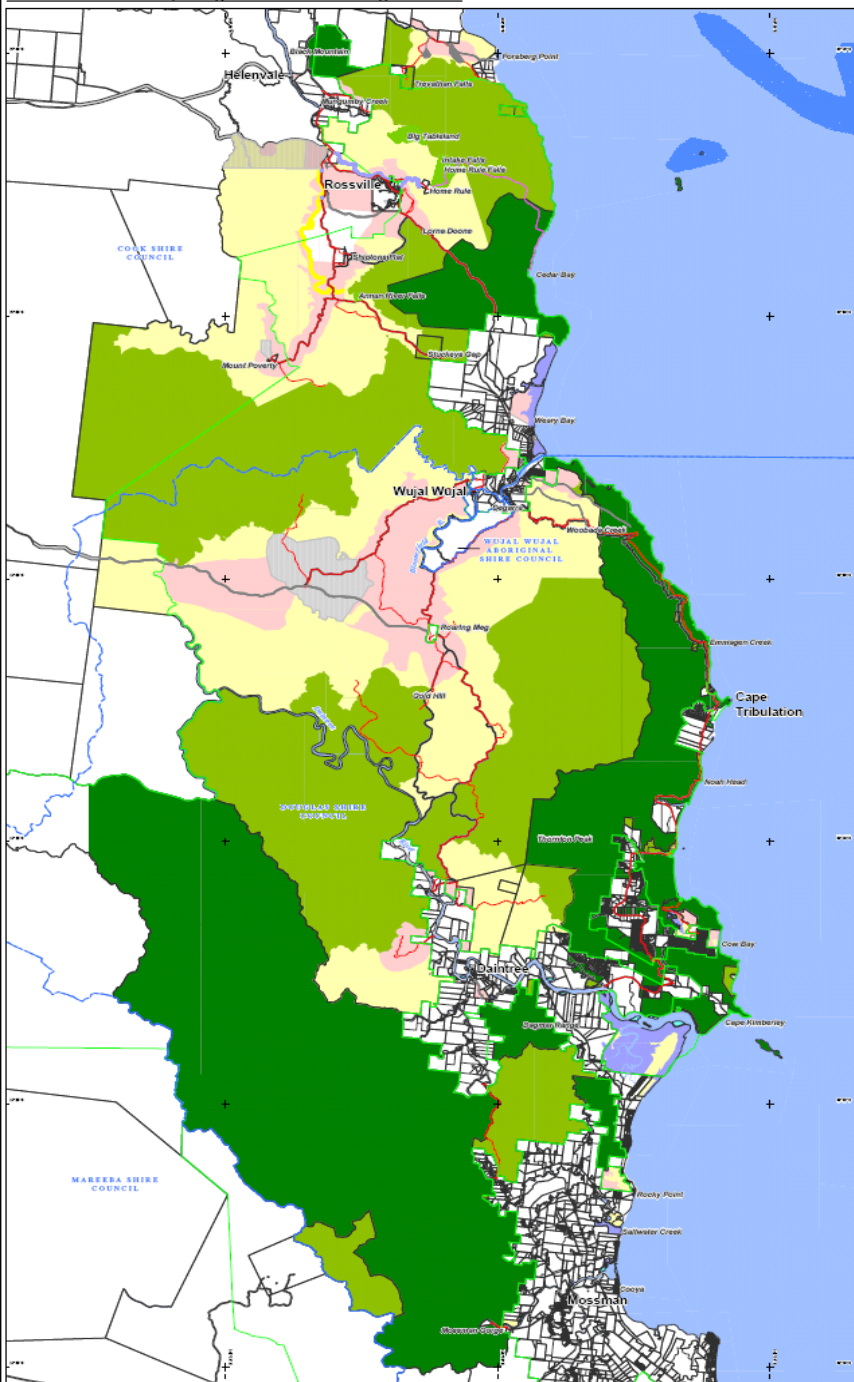
Jabalbina's Achievements 2009 -2012

- representing Bama in the survey and handover of 58 lots of Aboriginal freehold land
- completing management plans for 13 reserves for which it is trustee
- negotiating on approximately 10 applications to lease Aboriginal land
- negotiating on 8 national park plans and 11 reserve management plans, and
- dealing with several hundred native title and/or cultural heritage referrals and enquiries.

Jabalbina's Indigenous Protected Area Planning and Land Management

- IPA Planning commenced in 2011.
- Now have two dedicated IPAs Kuku Nyungkal and Yalanji warra.
- Yalanji warra to be dedicated later this year.
- Now employ an IPA Manager and 13 rangers to manage the IPA.
- The overheads of these grants also fund the administration of the corporation.

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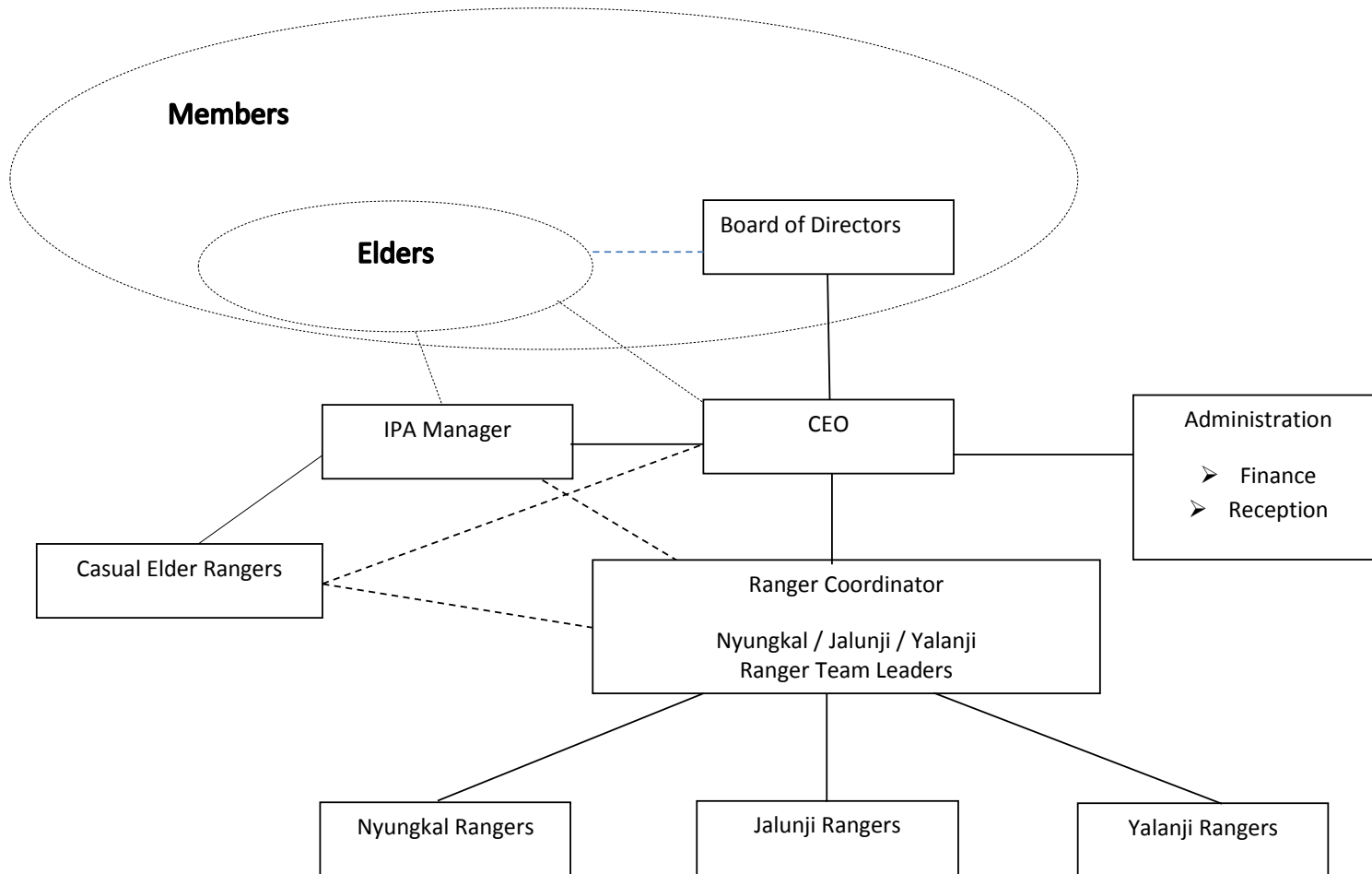
