23/12/2015	NSW	'Whitefella' draws up own treaty for his land with traditional owners	The Dabee have been given a treaty by a non-Indigenous family for recognition of their country situated in New South Wales' easterly region. Mr Dixon a spokesman for the family has drafted a document that acknowledges the Dabee as the traditional owners of the land. Dixon says that 'he chose to draft his own treaty because he did not want to wait years for the federal government to declare the land belonged to the Dabee under Native Title law'. Ms Syme a senior Dabee woman said with reference to Mr Dixon's efforts 'that I think he's really trying to make amends for what happened in the past and, like, he wants to ensure that his family knows the real history of this area where he's come to live.' 7/12/2015	NSW	Mining funds reserved for Indigenous groups allegedly funnelled back to industry	The Upper Hunter Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Trust in New South Wales is under scrutiny because it has allegedly failed to distribute trust money to Indigenous communities, and instead provided money for mining development in the region. Upper Hunter native title claimant Scott Franks said 'he believed the money was to be used exclusively to safeguard Indigenous sites and fund local projects'. Concerned Gamilaraay member, Paul Spearim said CSG and coal mining was not welcomed because 'levels of uranium leaked in the Pilliga four years ago, and it is still a barren waste land today.' The following day Gamilaraay people travelled to Tamworth. Mr Spearim said 'we attended and protested the signing off to address the Goomeroi Native Title Group about their transparency and why they had not communicated the larger picture with surrounding communities'. Mansfield described NLC's efforts as a disgrace in relation to outstanding claims including 'Mary River, Middle Arm, Weddell and Larrimah'. Joe Morrison, NLC CEO responded and said 'the council greatly respected Justice Mansfield and accepted his concerns. We are proud of our record we have achieved more native title settlements than anywhere else in the country, and despite extra money from the commonwealth our native title workload remains heavy.' Burragubba's appeal is financially backed by green lobby groups; however, other native title claimants are in the process of negotiating a land use agreement with Adani. A spokesman for Minister for State Development, Natural Resources and Mines, Anthony Lynham, said 'he could not provide a mining lease to Adani until Mr Burragubba's case was resolved'. One grant in particular \$62,315 will be provided to Mullen Bun Goon Pty Ltd to assist in managing three culturally significant sites, on Mamu's native title land in Wooroonooran National Park. This dispute is related to the 'first Ankamuthi native title claim lodged over north-western Cape York Peninsula.' Despite Larry Woosup (an Ankamuthi descendant) making a deal with Gulf Aluminia, a group of 75 Ankamuthi people have voiced their concerns suggesting 'that they were not aware of the deal, nor have they benefited from it.' Martin hopes that signing up to a new set of investment standards for 'Indigenous groups backed by Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull and David Murray will help attract the right financing partners' for his project. Investment opportunities will be discussed at an event on Monday at KPMG's offices in Sydney to 'launch the Indigenous Investment Principles - a voluntary best-practice framework designed to lift governance standards and investment skills within native title organisations'. Mr Turnbull, Robynne Quiggin the Australian Indigenous Governance Institute chairwoman, and Mr Martin 'representing the interests of 20 native title groups' will attend. This notice is part of the legal requirements in which an exploration permit is later granted to allow for gold diggings to occur, in and around the hills situated in both the west and north-west of Gympie. This notice is important for native title claimants because the area covered by the permit application suggests that they and 'the company - VGE Pty Ltd are required by the <i>Native Title Act</i> 1993 (Commonwealth) to enter into 'Expedited Procedures and negotiations to resolve any native title and cultural heritage issues.' More than 200 people commemorated the 179 th Proclamation on Monday the 28 of December 2015 at an official ceremony that was held at Old Gum Tree reserve in Glenelg, where Governor Hindmarsh's secretary George Stevenson read the 'Proclamation' describing South Australia's inauguration as a British province in 1836. Throughout this ceremony Australian Native Title and Reconciliation members protested against British incursion 'calling for the protection of Aboriginal land and acknowledging Aboriginal people through advisory committees.' The claim covers seven pastoral leases and towns including Innamincka. Yawarrawarrka elder Theresa Bottrell said 'the ruling would be a great achievement'. The lawyer representing the group, Michael Pagsanjan, said the 'claim had taken so long because of the notoriously slow process and rigorous conditions that must be met for native title to be established.' This coincides with the issues related to the current South Australian government, who has recently been challenged by the Liberal opposition, fishing industry and traditional owners with the proposal of a cull. Liberal opposition agriculture spokesman Adrian Pederick, said 'authorities should caution Mr Sumner rather than prosecute him. If the state government tried to prosecute Mr Sumner, he might win on native title grounds, which could cost the state hundreds of thousands of dollars in legal fees'.
