

Background







NTRB Research

- YMAC has acted as the representative body for native title claims in the Pilbara, Murchison and Gascoyne since 1999.
- Research conducted by anthropologists with respected community members creates a wealth of traditional knowledge about language, culture and significant places on country.





Invaluable material

- The resulting collection of oral history, cultural information and personal and traditional stories is an impressive, one-of-a-kind record of Aboriginal history.
- A valuable resource to Aboriginal families and communities as well as to future researchers.
- A rich source of linguistic, archaeological, anthropological, historical and traditional information and knowledge.





Possible future uses

- Present: Access is limited.
- Possible future uses are:
 - -cultural centres.
 - -interactive databases.
 - -heritage projects.
 - -oral history projects.
 - -publications.
 - -multi-media projects.
 - -language projects.





Requests for return

- Steady increase in the amount of requests for returning native title research material by PBCs.
- Success =

Determine an appropriate methodology that is:

- Organised,
- Culturally appropriate
- In consultation with the native title group.





YMAC RoRM Policy

- A policy was drafted in 2013, which outlines YMAC's return of research and litigation material process.
- Returning materials to:
 - Individuals
 - PBCs and Legal Representatives.





YMAC RoRM Policy

- The policy describes:
 - -The stages of the return process
 - -Types of research materials
 - -Associated restrictions

 Gives an estimated timeframe for the process to completed.





Individuals

- Entitled access to the material and information they themselves have provided.
- Initiated by filling out and signing the appropriate form.
- Processed only when the request is legitimate.





Individuals

- Requests can be made by the person in question, or, by his/her close relative only.
- Each application is assessed on a case-by-case basis.
- Can access:
 - The originals
 - Copies of the originals
 - A transcript of the information and material they have provided to YMAC.





PBCs and Legal Representatives

- Litigation material and general native title research material can be requested by an authorised PBC or a Legal Representative.
- Proof of authority can be requested by YMAC prior to processing the request.





Personal research

The material provided will not include research material that falls under the 'Personal research material' category, unless otherwise agreed.

Personal research material includes items such as:

- Personal photographs
- Personal video material
- Personal written material
- Fieldnotes from interviews
- Recorded audio material
- Official personal documents, such as Native Affairs files; Birth, Death and Marriage Certificates
- Witness statements
- Claimant profiles





Cultural sensitivities

The best methodology is developed in unison with YMAC, the PBC and the group.

- Meetings
- Workshops
- Informed consent





Acknowledgement

- Procedure developed, material collated and delivered according to the instructions.
- Acknowledgement of the Receipt of Research and Litigation Material signed by a PBC or legal representative upon receipt.
- This will identify the material returned, restrictions and procedures agreed on.





Workshops

- Assistance with two Return of Research Materials Workshops to trial the policy in practice.
- Two determined claims:
 - -Ngarla (2010)
 - -Nyangumarta (2009)
- YMAC representatives and the anthropologist who conducted the connection research met with claim group representatives Oct 2013 and Mar 2014.





Workshops

- Anthropological and legal advice was sought ahead the workshops.
- This advice addressed:
 - Cultural sensitivities, particularly in the connection report and genealogies.
 - Suggestions for the redacted version of the connection report to be provided to the PBC.
- Aim \rightarrow to create acceptable protocol and procedure that could be applied to the different types of research materials.

- Aims of the workshop and overview of policy
- Types of research materials held
- Limitations of research materials
- Restrictions (cultural or legal) regarding research material
- The priority materials to be returned
- Whom the material will be returned to
- Format the material will be returned in
- Who will have access to material and who will manage access
- Where material will be stored (short term/long term)
- Managing requests from external researchers
- Special protocols for particular items to be returned





Limitations

- Material created for specific purposes (native title)
- The connection reports reflect the 'native title story' of the group.
- Historical documents are open to interpretation.
- Language in old documents.
- Site locations in site maps and registers may be estimations only.
- Genealogies are never complete.





Long term plans

Material often held at YMAC.

YMAC will keep a copy of the research materials.

 Opportunities for YMAC and PBCs to work hand in hand.





Outcomes

- A tailored procedure and guidelines document was created.
- Signed by participants and YMAC.
- Actual return process commenced.
- Feedback from the workshops has been positive.





Lessons learnt

- A rewarding process.
- Many possibilities for future use of the material in the communities, not forgetting the personal value for family members.
- Organising workshops and return of research material process takes considerable effort – (time, funding, staff).
- Challenge to maintain high standard and within reasonable timeframes.





Lessons learnt

 Processing AV material is highly time-consuming and costly.

 Identifying priority items to be returned makes the process more satisfying for all parties.
