

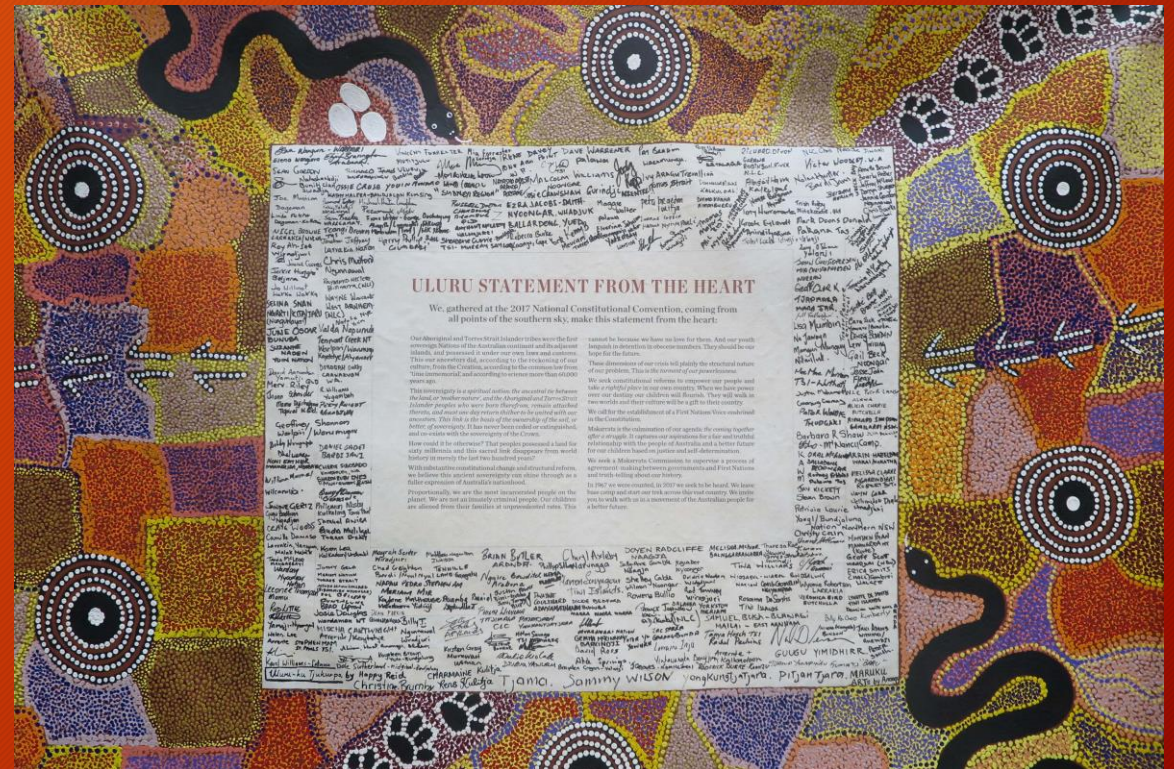

# Uluru Guiding Principles

- Does not diminish Aboriginal sovereignty and Torres Strait Islander sovereignty.
- Involves substantive, structural reform.
- Advances self-determination and the standards established under the UNDRIP.
- Recognises the status and rights of First Nations.
- Tells the truth of history.

# Uluru Guiding Principles

- Does not foreclose on future advancement.
- Does not waste the opportunity of reform.
- Provides a mechanism for First Nations agreement-making.
- Has the support of First Nations.
- Does not interfere with positive legal arrangements.

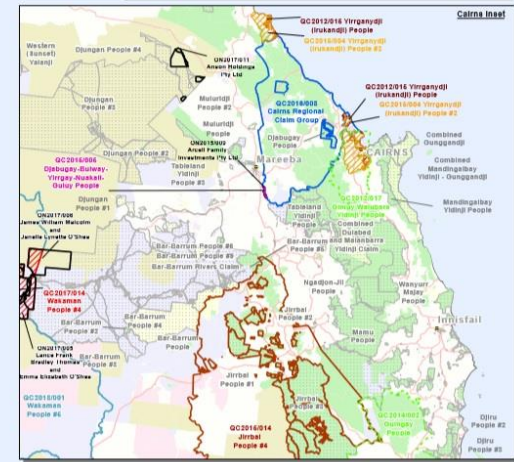
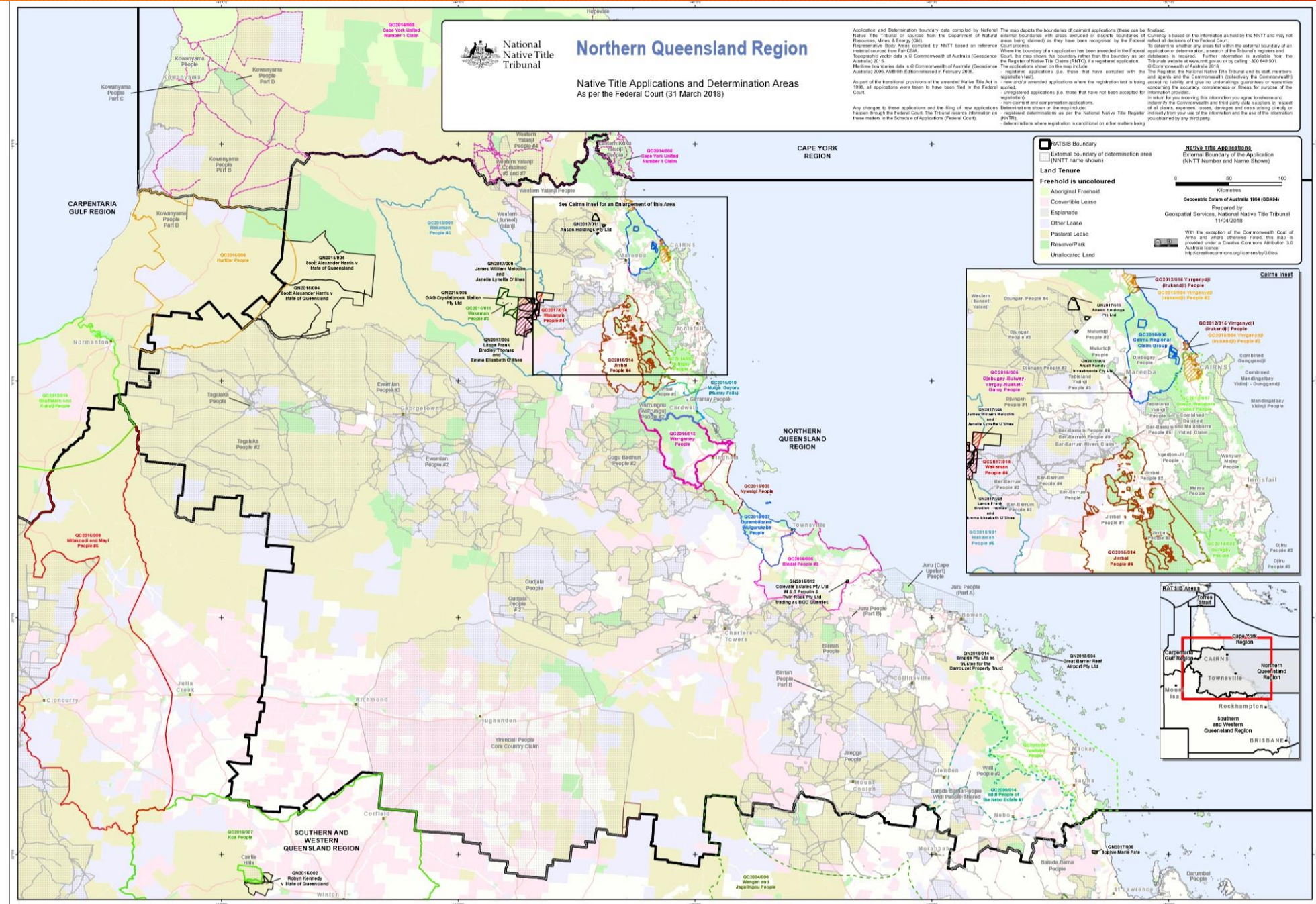

As part of the transitional provisions of the amended Native Title Act in 1998, all applications were taken to have been filed in the Federal Court.

Any changes to these applications and the filing of new applications happen through the Federal Court. The Tribunal records information on these matters in the Schedule of Applications (Federal Court).
